Distance, Time, and Leap Year

istance varies. You know. For a young person, hopefully, he or she can get out of bed and do a nice long walk, a hike, or for you farmers out there, hop the postern and head out to the far field without breaking a sweat. They might not listen, but they're not afraid to charge ahead. Middle-aged folks, well, we're mostly wise enough to know we're not young folks (although that doesn't stop us from getting lost in the middle distance with a pile of anxious detours). That riding lawn mower is beginning to look more comfy – or better yet - the kids can mow, bale hay, and that extra shift can wait.

For some folks of a certain age and generation, the distance from one's chair to the front door might be a great distance. Breath by breath, things seem further away. The remote control. The grocery store. A letter from a loved one - a loved one who lives not only in another state but a state of mind.

Regardless of our age, we pray our distance with God should never be far. You science folks out there know that distance and time often go together. Time with God can certainly mend the distance. This isn't just about prayer or reading the Bible – all good things. This also about following the call of God. Fast or slow, all Christians are on a trip. While we should be close with Him, that also means He will send us out – sometimes to stranger places than the grocery store. And as we all know, the world is full of temptations. Nothing new here. The first Sunday of Lent always starts us with the Temptation of Jesus in the wilderness. We'll hear from Mark this year. His Temptation account is very short, so it is immediately followed by Jesus beginning His ministry. Like John the Baptist before Him, Jesus says those important words that cover the distance: repent and believe. (Luther would say that's Law & Gospel right there). And listen for the call. Wherever we are with matters of time or location, may we still live out this call – and know that we are NOT alone.

For this year, the 40 Days will take a special theme of going on a trek or expedition - what you need, what you pack, where you go – all pointing us to the destination of the cross and beyond. I pray Immanuel keeps its eyes on the prize that God has won for us – and the Kingdom that has begun. In the meantime, may we "repent and believe" and heed the call, grow in faith while shortening the distance in our Godly relationship. Oh – and one extra challenge for us all: it's Leap Year. We have an extra day, so to say on February 29. Even on a regular day – do we find time to give thanks for the distance covered by the love of Jesus Who died for us? It's not about you – but it's for you.

Remember an extra pair of preferably clean socks, a light snack, grab the Good Book, know the Holy Spirit protects and guides us – so pack up – here we go!

NALC 20/20 Vision

After two years of planning, the North American Lutheran Church kicked off the 2020 Mission Vision in 2023. This is a strategic vision to help ensure the future and mission of the NALC. The NALC is a young Church and is growing, which creates both challenges and opportunities. Part of this vision is to raise 5 million dollars for the support of this mission. The 2020 Vision is to focus on four areas to Grow, Serve, Renew and Fulfill. Current commitments exceed 2.1 million dollars. These commitments have come from both congregations and individuals. That's a great start. Some of the on-going mission support of the NALC is through congregational renewal projects and raising up pastors. As of this writing, there are currently 66 congregations actively in the call process and only 61 rostered NALC pastors actively seeking a call. We are also a growing Church and need support in starting new Churches and missions.

Your stewardship and finance committee would like to extend this invitation of the 2020 Mission Vision to Immanuel and provide a way for us to support the larger church. Ask the Pastor

So I get the 40 Days of Lent are based on Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness. Great. So how do those days get counted – because there's more than forty days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Eve.

Churches vary on this one. Some count Sundays, some don't. Sometimes Holy Week is treated differently (it's an East/West calendar thing along with other things). If you're doing a Lenten devotion – as Immanuel will provide some – you don't stop on Sundays do we? Pastor reminds us not to fuss too much about the count – and not sound like kids in the back seat screaming "are we there yet!?" Enjoy the ride. Besides, sometimes a good detour reminds us of why we're on the trip in the first place.



The Grief Ministry resumes on Sunday, February 25. Need a little time to either listen or share about grief? Consider joining us. We meet at 8 a.m. in the Conference Room, prior to the start of Holy Communion.

Pastor's Challenge

The first part of Exodus is exciting and cinematic. More than a few movies have used Exodus for inspiration. Moses is center stage, although Aaron, Miriam, and few others have important roles, including the heart-hardened Pharoah. While Moses is important, God's role is even more important. Likewise, so is God's relationship with His people. As you read Exodus, carefully follow the ups and downs of this relationship. The Israelites seem stubborn – at times! You will quickly realize that with human nature, even in the Bible, the more things change – the more things stay the same.

The second half of Exodus tips into the challenging Book of Leviticus. While some struggle with the third Book of the Bible, others are fascinated by its various laws and customs. The 10 Commandments we find in Exodus (and Deuteronomy as well) are better expressed as the 10 "words" (that's literally what Decalogue means). There are actually 613 commandments in the first five books of the Bible – many of them found in our February readings. While Jesus fulfilled the Law, negating many ceremonial laws we find, the moral law remains in effect for us, as it shows us our sin – and our need for a Savior. All of which is perfect timing for Lent.

TREASURER'S REPORT

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Outreach - The following was reported -

Eight College Care packages were sent to college parishioners in November. Students were appreciative of the packages.

25 gift bags with donated items and tie blankets were donated to two assisted living facilities in Watertown.

Disconnected members from church will be receiving a gift bag consisting of soup mix, gift cards and lotion and/or candy. Focus will start with individuals who are current members who have not been able to attend due to unforeseen circumstances. One or two members will be chosen monthly.

Souper Bowl Sunday is February 11, 2024. We will again be making our Immanuel Lutheran Church famous chili and cheddar broccoli soup. All quarts will sell for \$8. Members can also bring cans of soup during this time to donate to the food pantry.

Dockhounds Game will be scheduled for June or July, more information to follow.

Signage at the church - looking for someone to take over responsibilities of making signage changes. Outreach will put information in the Country Christian etc.

Property Committee: Bruce Pfeifer's report included:

Church –Sidewalk cracks need to be cleaned out of old caulk, sand added and re-caulked-TBD East windows to be trimmed, date TBD

Church Cross metal I beam needs priming and painting. Kitchen cabinets to be primed and painted, date TBD.

Nolte has completed installation of the organ, we received a credit of \$3,000 for the volunteer work performed. Final payment needs to be sent.

Railing on front steps-will accept bid to rebuild the bottoms of existing posts from John Ellis Balcony wall repairs, getting bid for repairs Kirt Kemnitz has volunteered to join the property committee

Parsonage – Walk through to be scheduled for 2024 budget. Service will be contacted for dishwasher repair.

Fellowship Hall – Janitor job description being completed. Floor Scrubber, walk behind being looked at and priced out.

Teacherage –Building is in need of tuck pointing, scheduling repair dates with Josh Reichert.

Posts on front porch rotting out on bottoms, scheduling replacement.

School – Installed windbreak on north entrance to prevent door damage. Water fountain in basement repaired by Jack and Wayne. Main circulating pump on furnace went out, used backup to fix, looking for replacement.

Stewardship & Finance – Russell Tietz's report included -

NALC 20/20 Vision: Today-Tomorrow-Forever Campaign. There was an article in the Country Christian regarding this campaign. The campaign will be mentioned at the Semi-Annual Meeting in January and additional information provided to the congregation. Looking at providing envelopes in February for a special offering for those who would like to contribute. The NALC has a goal to raise \$5 million dollars.

Pipes and Panes – The final organ payment will be made in the amount of \$7,000. The volunteer labor saved us \$3,000.

E-giving – Stewardship and Finance is looking at other e-giving options through Vanco and Venmo along with using QR codes. Other e-giving options are being pursued.

The Gary Neitzel memorial gift of \$9,000 will remain in the general fund at this time.

LLS had a wonderful Christmas season! Preparation for Accreditation continues. 2024 School safety plan has been submitted to the DOJ. Basketball season is underway and going well. The October book fair was a big success. Hannah presented a JSB meeting guest policy, it was approved and will be added to the JSB Handbook.

New Business

Memorial – Dr. Wolfe Knappe recently passed away (father of Dean Knappe), a memorial was discussed. A Motion was made by Sue Rhodes to send a \$100 Memorial to the Society of The Holy Trinty, seconded by Bruce Pfeifer. Motion passed. Monies will come from the discretionary fund. Ballots for candidates will be prepared for the Semi-Annual meeting.

Malawi Orphan Care Project – Pam Bartee announced that our Malawi contact, Shadrak and Yami Chikoti and their three children will be coming to the United States in August. The family will be visiting Ohio and traveling through several other states. The Chikoti's already have plans for all Sunday's but would be available for a weekday visit to Lebanon. Pam would like to invite them to a weekday pot luck to meet and greet with congregation members. Shandra Zastrow made a Motion to have Pam invite the family and organize a meet and greet with the Chikoti family. Seconded by Debbie Schramm. Motion passed.

Other Discussion Items for the Good and Betterment of the Church

School Discussion – At the last Joint Council meeting there was a discussion on the declining enrollment of the school. Each church council was tasked with having a discussion at their council meetings on the subject. We are not unique to other schools, public school enrollment is also declining but parochial schools even more rapidly. There is a concern about the continued declining enrollment, currently there are 57 students enrolled in LLS (compared to 75 several years ago). Discussion included - smaller families, more extra-curricular options at public schools, cost to attend, home schooling, etc. The council is looking at options for the future of LLS - marketing campaign, school choice, etc. Discussion will be continued.

Semi-Annual Meeting January 21, 2024

Council President Tom Kulke called the meeting to order. Pastor Repp opened the meeting with prayer.

The agenda and financials were sent by e-mail prior to the meeting and available upon request to congregation members in attendance.

Approval of July 25, 2023 Annual Meeting Minutes – Tom Kulke requested any additions or changes to the minutes. A Motion was made by Sheri Uecker to approve the minutes as presented, seconded by Linda Hensler. Motion passed.

Treasurer's Report - Shandra Zastrow shared the financials for July through December 2023. Total income is \$275,364.26 less expenses of \$257,534.13, add back Designated Funds In for Purchases of \$55,572.72, minus Designated Purpose Funds Out of \$41,052.05 for a positive difference of \$32,350.80.

Shandra mentioned that the memorial fund balance has been repaid but we still have a balance of \$125,000 in the investment program. This past year we have been fortunate to receive some sizeable donations from members/past members. There was a suggestion to remember the church in your will.

A Motion to accept the financial report was made by Jack Ewert, seconded by Howie Gutzdorf. Motion passed.

Pipes and Panes Project Update – the organ is up and running. A re-dedication is scheduled for February 11th. The final \$10,0000 payment has been reduced to \$7,000, this is due to a \$3,000 credit for volunteer work.

The window project is tentatively scheduled to begin this spring. Waiting on a reply from the vendor on start date.

Stewardship & Finance Committee Update – Russ Tietz thanked the congregation for their financial support of our Mission (church, school, current and future special projects). The 12/31/23 financial report includes several special financial gifts, but remember that nine months of the year we were in the negative. This year's budget increased approximately 7% - please reconsider your financial gifts if you can. \$177,794 has been raised for the Pipes and Panes project, all the funds needed for the organ have been received. Approximately \$52,000 needs to be raised for the window project.

The NALC 2020 Vision campaign is seeking to raise \$5 million dollars to support the growth of the NALC (support for new churches, seminary support, education of new pastors, etc.) A special offering will be held in February to support the NALC 2020 Vision campaign, look for more information in the Country Christian. The committee continues to look for new opportunities such as egiving for making financial gifts.

Tom Kulke mentioned that church expenses do not stop if you are not in church, consider using the giving envelopes on Sunday's you are not in attendance to help cover monthly expenses.
